## A LETTER FROM THE PASTOR

Dear friends in the Word Made Flesh,

This week each year the Catholic Church observes Migration Week, a time for deepening our awareness of the needs of immigrants, refugees, migrants and exiles in our own land and throughout the world.

The scripture readings for this season make the observance of Migration Week especially appropriate. The Nativity gospel itself, of course, is the story of a woman with child and her husband uprooted from their home by decree of an alien occupying power, who find themselves unwelcome and without shelter in an unfamiliar city. Shortly after the child's birth, the same family find themselves refugees in Egypt, again in a land where their language is not spoken and where they would receive the scorn and rejection that societies reserve for the stranger and immigrant.

From the beginning of salvation history, care and protection for the stranger has been among God's first injunctions to his people. The book of Leviticus articulates a commandment repeated throughout the Hebrew scriptures: "When an alien resides with you in your land, do not molest him. You shall treat the alien who resides with you no differently than the natives born among you; have the same love for him as for yourself; for you too were once aliens in the land of Egypt" (19:33-34). And the New Testament identifies the stranger we are called to serve with the very person of Christ: "For I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me drink, a stranger and you welcomed me..." (Matthew 25:35).

I hope it goes without saying that, while our nation struggles with the moral imperative to accomplish [comprehensive immigration reform](#), all God's people will continue to find a Christ-like welcome at IHM—with those in need finding the preferential welcome demanded by the scriptures and our Catholic tradition. For they are, wherever their origin or whatever their language, indeed sisters and brothers to us.
